Lemont Township Board Meeting – May 14, 2013

Meeting called to order by Supervisor Rosendahl at 7:00 p.m. at the Township offices at 1115 Warner Avenue, Lemont, IL. Pledge of Allegiance was said. Roll call was taken by Clerk Buschman: Garvey, Nicklas, Ptacek, Wozniak and Rosendahl-present. Also in attendance was Assessor Jacobowski, Highway Commissioner Vaznelis, and Township Administrator Hoinacki. Clerk Buschman noted that this was Trustee Garvey's last meeting, as he did not seek re-election in April.

Motion was made by Nicklas, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Ptacek, to approve minutes of previous meeting. Motion passed by voice vote.

Motion made by Garvey, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Nicklas to approve payment of the bills. On roll call: Garvey, Nicklas, Ptacek, Wozniak and Rosendahl – Aye. Motion passed.

**MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC:** None

**REPORTS:**

**SUPERVISOR:** Supervisor Rosendahl reported on his attendance, along with Trustee Ptacek, at Topics Day in Springfield. They visited with Senator Radogno and others at the Capital. He also announced that legislation was passed to abolish Evanston Township. The Mayor of Evanston and the Township Supervisor are one. It was passed in the Senate and is now going to the House. Rosendahl is going to the Retirement Party for Nancy Vandeerweel, Supervisor of Elk Grove Village. He also commented on the Earth Day Festivities held on April 20. Weather wasn't good but Pizzo & Associates were in attendance and took those present on a tour around the Township Building and explained much about plants and trees. Rosendahl attended Cook County Public Aid meeting. He is the Chairman of that group.

**HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER:** Road Commissioner Vaznelis introduced Al Rugienius who gave a slide presentation on the workings of the Highway Department. He rode around all 19 subdivisions with John Heeg and documented what needs to be done and in what areas. He looked at roads, drainage, guard rails, etc. He conferred with Vaznelis and they identified which projects would be prioritized. About \$2,000,000.00 will be budgeted. Major projects to be done first will be drainage and ROW projects which will be done by Heeg and summer employees. They will do minor repairs as necessary.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> area will be the paving program which will include subdivisions of South Equestrian, East Fox Point and Sylvan Woods. Rugienius explained a relatively new paving process that goes through two machines; one does the grinding of the old asphalt, and the second one re-heats the asphalt and puts it back down. There is only one company with these machines but the Township is working with a consortium of other Townships and Villages to get a better price. Cost will be about \$10.00 a sq. yard as opposed to the old price of \$14.00 a sq. yard. It lays about 20" per minute. The Township did core sampling in every subdivision. Fox Point is not suitable for this process.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> area to be covered will be Building Improvements which consists of erecting a flag pole at the Township Garage, a new ceiling in the old garage, floor improvements, lighting, and new pipes. Trustee Nicklas questioned the material of pipes. They will be using plastic. Supervisor Rosendahl praised the presentation and thanked Road Commissioner Vaznelis for providing it.

**HUMAN SERVICES:** A Human Services report was handed to the Board which included needing of Volunteers for Donut Days for the Salvation Army. We get to keep what we collect. Also, a program called "Within my Reach" which presents tools for building and maintaining healthy relationships. Report is attached.

**TOWNSHIP ASSESSOR:** Assessor Jacobowski announced that we are now open for appeals and will be open until June 10. He encouraged anyone who wanted to make an appointment to come in to the office. Open daily and some night hours, but should call and make an appointment. Joyce Black, Administrative Assistant to the Assessor is getting a new computer. A new program called "My Property Tracker" will be installed on this computer.

**TOWNSHIP CLERK:** Clerk Buschman reported and she and Administrative Assistant Bette Ganta, attended a Cook County Clerk Meeting in New Trier Township. Cook County Clerk David Orr was in attendance. Also, Lemont will be sponsoring the Cook County Clerk meeting on November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2013.

**OPEN SPACE:** The Township is partnering with The Keepataw Group and is having a "Family Fun Day on June 21, 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Open Space property. All involved are donating their time and talents.

**PLAN COMMISSION:** No report.

**NEW BUSINESS:** No report

Motion to adjourn made by Trustee Garvey, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Trustee Wozniak at 8:07 p.m. Motion passed. Being Trustee Garvey's last board meeting, all thanked him for his 8 years of service and wished him well in his new endeavors.

SECTION 6: That Section 3 shall be and is a summary of annual Appropriation Ordinance of this township, passed by the Board of Trustees as required by law and shall be in full force and effect from and after this date.

**ORDINANCE NO 2013-2014-4**

**AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING PREVAILING WAGE RATES  
TO BE PAID TO LABORERS, MECHANICS AND OTHER WORKERS  
PERFORMING CONSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC WORKS  
IN LEMONT TOWNSHIP,  
COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS**

**WHEREAS**, the State of Illinois has enacted the Prevailing Wage Act, approved June 26, 1941, as amended, being 820 ILCS 130/0.01 through 130/12; and

**WHEREAS**, the Act requires that during the month of June of each calendar year the Town Board of Lemont Township investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages, as defined in said Act, in the locality of the Township for laborers, mechanics and other workers performing construction of public works for the Township.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE SUPERVISOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF LEMONT TOWNSHIP, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:**

**Section 1:** To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Township is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Cook County as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 1, 2013, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Township. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

**Section 2:** Nothing herein contained is intended to apply nor shall be construed to

apply said prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment performed on behalf of this Township except public works construction to the extent required by the Act.

**Section 3:** If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

**Section 4:** All Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**Section 5:** The Township Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Township this determination of prevailing rate of wages. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specification.

**Section 6:** The Township Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Secretary of State of Illinois in Springfield.

**Section 7:** Within thirty (30) days after filing a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Secretary of State, the Township Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice that this determination is effective and constitutes the determination of this public body.



**Section 8:** The Township Clerk shall mail a copy of this Ordinance to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

**Section 9:** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

**EXPLANATION OF CLASSES**

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

#### COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

#### MARBLE FINISHER

If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

#### LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

**Section 2:** Nothing herein contained is intended to apply nor shall be construed to apply said prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment performed on behalf of this Lemont Township Road and Bridge District except public works construction to the extent required by the Act.

**Section 3:** If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

**Section 4:** All Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**Section 5:** The Township Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Township this determination of prevailing rate of wages. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specification.

**Section 6:** The Township Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Secretary of State of Illinois in Springfield.

**Section 7:** Within thirty (30) days after filing a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Secretary of State, the Township Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice that this determination is effective and constitutes the determination of this public body.

**Section 8:** The Township Clerk shall mail a copy of this Ordinance to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

**Section 9:** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

**EXPLANATION OF CLASSES**

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

#### CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

#### COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

#### MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

Five axle trucks; Dump Crets and Adgetors 7 yards and over; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnatrailers or turnapulls when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment over 16 cubic yards; Explosives and/or Fission Material Trucks; Mixer Trucks 7 yards or over; Mobile Cranes while in transit; Oil Distributors, 1-man operation; Pole Trailer, over 40 feet; Pole and Expandable Trailers hauling material over 50 feet long; Slurry trucks, 1-man operation; Winch trucks, 3 axles or more; Mechanic--Truck Welder and Truck Painter.

Class 4. Six axle trucks; Dual-purpose vehicles, such as mounted crane trucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic;
